

## Pupil Premium Impact Statement 2015 - 2016

During the year 5 pupil premium children left the school meaning we had less money (income) than we thought. (£13,780 instead of £19,540). Luckily we had left some money unallocated.

The grant was spent on:

### **Breakfast Club**

2 members of staff were paid to provide cover for before school care. Parents paid a minimal amount to cover the cost of food. This facility provided a good start to the day for the children.

### **Interventions**

A specialist teaching assistant was paid to provide small group tuition in English and maths in KS2 and 1-1 support for KS1 and KS2. These children have closed gaps in their learning.

We also paid £250 to enable a pupil premium child to have extra tuition before sitting the Grammar school entrance test.

### **Pupil Enrichment**

Trips out and visitors in to enrich the curriculum for all children (especially Pupil Premium) are not possible within our overall school budget without extra funding.

Our parents cannot afford to pay the full cost of such activities therefore we feel subsidising these was an excellent use of part of the pupil premium.

The children really enjoyed visits to the Roman Villa (KS2) Steam Railway and Waterways Museum (KS1) and Roves Farm (EYFS), also the Black Country Museum (KS1), Pates Grammar School production (KS2) and Butterfly World (EYFS).
